November was a constant stream of activity as we learned, shared, and made music on campus and beyond. Following a few final hills to climb, the academic cycle means that soon we rest, reflect, and- all too soon- prepare for the start of a new semester. Our students and directors have worked hard all month to present beautiful and thought-provoking performances. From the combined, "kaleidoscopic" performance of the Concert Choir and Wind Ensemble at the beginning of the month, through smaller presentations of our chamber groups, Musical Theatre Ensemble, and a stellar senior recital by vocalist Robert Moore, to the rousing sounds of Latin America with the Muskingum Valley Symphonic Winds and the rock strains of Muskie Rocks at Weasel Boy Brewing Company in Zanesville, our musicians have done what they do best: bringing music to the entire campus and regional community. At the same time, some 100 regional high-school students brought their musical talents to campus to participate in a day of learning and making music with the band/choir YouthFest. Our students have taken their knowledge and energy out to the local schools, sharing information about careers in music with students at Morgan West Elementary School. Dr. Abeyaratne has taken his beautiful pianoplaying to performances in Texas, West Virginia, and the recording studio. Meanwhile, I've been busy traveling: first, to the joint "mega-conference" of the American Musicological Society, the Society for Ethnomusicology, and the Society for Music Theory in New Orleans to share new research on music and disability and then to the annual meeting for the National Association of Schools of Music in St. Louis to connect with member institutions from around the country and discuss the ins and outs of the accreditation process (which we renew next year). We now prepare for two final concerts of the semester: the Southeastern Ohio Symphony Orchestra presents a holiday spectacular at Secrest Auditorium in Zanesville on December 1 and a variety of student, faculty, and professional musicians join forces for the annual Muskingum Christmas Festival in Brown Chapel on December 3. As we enter this holiday season, I hope you find time to rest, reflect, and make music!

Almost 100 high school students from thirteen different high schools participated in the return of the Choral and Instrumental YouthFest on November 5. Students participated in various rehearsals, masterclasses, and workshops with Muskingum faculty and students. They presented a showcase performance at the end of the day to share what they learned during the day, which included a concert choir, concert band, and a hand drumming ensemble. Directors were also invited to spend the day with us and a special presentation was made to them by Dr. Strychacz, Director of Choral Studies.





Students Selected for Honors Band

Five Muskingum students were selected to perform in the Ohio Private College Instrumental Conductors Association (OPCICA) Honors Concert Band at the annual honors festival in January at Case Western Reserve University. Students from nineteen different private colleges throughout Ohio are represented in the honors band. The Muskingum students selected are Victoria Vankirk-Hochstetler, contrabass clarinet; Sarah Heading, alto saxophone; Robert Moore, tuba; David Hochstetler, percussion; and Addie Young, percussion. The honors festival consists of the Honors Concert Band and the Honors Jazz Ensemble, who rehearse over the course of two days and give a concert on Sunday, January 21. OPCICA was founded in 1987 as a way for the instrumental programs in the private colleges to develop a closer network of communication and resource sharing. Muskingum College was one of the founding institutions.

This month, Music Education major Robert Moore presented a beautiful senior voice recital, including works by John Dowland, Gabriel Fauré, Robert Schumann, Harry Burleigh, and more. A tenor, Robert currently studies with Dr. Daniel Strychacz.
