# Celebration of Excellence: Congratulations!



## **END-OF-YEAR PERFORMANCES**

The month of April saw a tremendous array of performances by our ensembles, both on and off campus. We are so proud of successful senior recitals by Sarah Heading (saxophone), David Hochstetler (percussion), and David McDonald (voice). Our smaller ensembles (Chamber Singers, Clarinet Ensemble, Bassoon Ensemble, String Ensemble, Percussion Ensemble, Steel Drum Band, Musical Theatre Ensemble, and Jazz Ensemble) brought down the house with a series of performances featuring composers like Morten Lauridsen, Jason Robert Brown, and Duke Ellington. Guest pianist Gerald Lee (Professor of Piano at West Liberty University) presented a beautiful program of works by Frederic Chopin, Franz Liszt, Franz Schubert, and Alexander Scriabin. The Spring Choir Concert ("To See a World"), featuring our Concert Choir and Chamber Singers, highlighted selections from around the world, including pieces in nine languages: English, isiXhosa, Icelandic, German, Latvian, Latin, Quechua, Irish, and Japanese, as well as a song by contemporary composer Reena Esmail using Hindustani syllables meant to mimic percussion sounds. The Southeastern Ohio Symphony Orchestra presented a season finale featuring music from "Movies, Musicals, and Television," including selections from James Bond to Pink Panther and everything in between. Finally, the Muskingum University Wind Ensemble joined forces with the Muskingum Valley Symphonic Winds to present a "Spring Pops Concert" with selections from John Williams, video games, and a jazz set featuring Muskingum alumna and current voice faculty, Stacey Russell Welker and community musicians Len Thomas (piano), George DeLancey (bass), and Bill Armstrong (drums). Meanwhile, Muskie Rocks performed on campus at Muskiepalooza and off campus at Weasel Boy Brewing in Zanesville. On Friday, May 5, they performed again outside of Coles Aircraft Gallery as the featured musicians for ArtCOZ musicians of the month for the First Friday Artwalk in downtown Zanesville.
