### This semester, we welcome eight new faculty members to the Muskingum ARTS family!

**Prof. Whitney Davis** (Artist Affiliate, Trumpet) holds a bachelor's degree in Trumpet Performance from The Ohio State University, a Master of Music in Trumpet Performance from Pennsylvania State University, and a DMA in Trumpet Performance from The Ohio State University. She regularly performs with orchestras across central Ohio, maintains a private studio in the Columbus area, and has previously taught at Pennsylvania State University and Denison University.

**Prof. John Drubel** (Lecturer of Art) holds a bachelor's degree in Art Education from Muskingum University, an MFA in Drawing and Painting from the Academy of Art University in San Francisco, and an MBA in Organizational Leadership from National University in San Diego. He has previously taught for New Philadelphia City Schools, Barbour County Schools in West Virginia, and Alderson-Broaddus University.

**Prof. Sean Heiser** (Visiting Assistant Professor of Art) is a Malaysian-born artist and writer. He holds a BFA in Painting and Drawing from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and an MFA in Painting and Drawing from the University of Tennessee. His work has been exhibited internationally, including at Ortega Y Gasset Projects in Brooklyn, New York, hotelpupik in Schiefling, Austria, and The Alice Wilds in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and published in New American Paintings. Prior to graduate school, he worked as an artist assistant, preparator, and art fabricator at the John Michael Kohler Art Center in Sheboygan, Wisconsin, and for galleries in Milwaukee, Chicago, and New York.


**Prof. Eric Kline** (Artist Affiliate, Violin) holds a bachelor's degree in Violin Performance from DePaul University and a Master of Music in Violin Performance and Literature and Performer's Certificate in Violin from Eastman School of Music. He has played with chamber and symphony orchestra throughout the United States and in Germany and currently serves as the Jim & Ida Copenhaver Ginter Chair in Violin with ProMusica Chamber Orchestra in Columbus.

**Prof. Robert Kunzinger** (Lecturer of Art) holds a bachelor's degree in Mass Communications and Journalism from St. Bonaventure University, a master's degree in Humanities and Arts from Pennsylvania State University, and an MFA in English (Creative Non-Fiction) from Old Dominion University. His work has been published widely and received a number of awards. He served as Associate Professor of Humanities, Language, and Speech for 30 years at Tidewater Community College in Virginia Beach, Virginia, in addition to teaching at Saint Leo University and Old Dominion University.

**Prof. Joseph Mueller** (Artist Affiliate, Cello) holds a bachelor's degree in Cello Performance from Indiana University and a Master of Music in Cello Performance from the University of Oklahoma. He regularly performs with orchestras across central Ohio and has previously taught at Capital University, in addition to Suzuki Music Columbus and the Denison University Suzuki Program.

**Prof. Corey Rubin** (Artist Affiliate, Composition) holds a bachelor's degree in Music from Cleveland State University, and Master of Music and DM in Composition from Indiana University. His compositions have been performed across the United States and Europe and received a number of awards. He has previously taught at Indiana University and Cleveland State University.

**Prof. Justin White** (Artist Affiliate, Tuba and Euphonium) holds a bachelor's degree in Tuba Performance from the University of Akron and a Master of Music in Tuba Performance from The Ohio State University. He regularly performs with ensembles across central Ohio, maintains a private studio in the Columbus area, and currently serves as Orchestra Personnel Manager for the Columbus Symphony Orchestra.



# GALLERY EXHIBITION



The Louis O. Palmer Gallery will present a group exhibition entitled Columbus Dreaming from September 7-27. In addition to her role at Muskingum, art professor Morgan Free is a co-founder and operator of the Dream Clinic Project Space in Columbus, a small gallery that provides exhibition opportunities to emerging contemporary artists from across the United States. 
# THE FUNKY FRESH, TOTALLY RIGHTEOUS, UPTOWN-COUNTDOWN -SHOWDOWN!

# FACULTY RECITAL

To celebrate his twentieth year of teaching at Muskingum, Associate Professor of Music and Coordinator of Keyboard Studies, Harsha Abeyaratne, will present a solo piano recital featuring Ludwig van Beethoven's "Appassionata" Sonata (1806) and Frederic Chopin's Ballade No. 1 (1836). During his time at Muskingum, Prof. Abeyaratne has played at prestigious venues like Carnegie Hall (Weill Recital Hall) in New York and St. Martin-in-the-Field in London, England, as well as several universities across the United States. The concert will take place on **Friday, September 22, at 7 pm** in Brown Chapel on the Muskingum campus and is free and open to the public with no ticket required.



## JAZZ MASTERCLASS AND RECITAL



On **Thursday, September 28, at 7 pm** in Brown Chapel, the music department will host a jazz trio, led by New York City-based guitarist and composer Abe Ovadia. Ovadia has been hailed by Musicvox Guitars as a "jazz virtuoso" and "one of the most innovative guitarists of our time." He holds a bachelor's degree from Berklee College of Music and a master's degree from New York University's prestigious jazz performance program. His dedication to honing his craft and pursuing excellence in his musical pursuits has earned him numerous accolades, including the title of Best Guitarist of 2016, as awarded by Hot House Jazz Magazine. This concert is free and open to the public with no tickets required. Following this performance, Ovadia will present a masterclass with music students to discuss technique, improvisation, and his career as a musician.

## ARTS MANAGEMENT SPEAKER



On **Friday, September 15, at 3:30 pm** in the Thompson Theatre in Caldwell Hall, the theatre department will host David Briggs '79, to talk about his career in arts management. After graduating from Muskingum with degrees in Theatre and Speech Communication, Briggs attended graduate school at Pittsburg State University to study Organizational Communication and at the University of North Carolina-Greensboro to study Theatre Management. He has taught, directed, designed, and produced shows at the high-school level, at Wilkes Community College, and at Lenoir-Rhyne University. In 1993, he was named Director of the Broyhill Civic Center at Caldwell Community College in North Carolina, where he oversaw the opening of the building, programming, contracts, marketing, rentals, and budgeting. In 2006, he became the Executive Director and President of Shaw Center for the Arts in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. In 2011, he became Director of High Point Theatre in North Carolina. Briggs also owns a venue management and consultation business and has served on several boards. This is a great opportunity for students from across the university to learn more about an exciting career path!
