Muskingum University

Muskingum University's proud heritage began in 1837, when Ohio was an infant state and covered wagons were bringing adventurous settlers westward over the newly completed National Road through New Concord. The University's Native American name, sometimes mispronounced and often misspelled, is a source of pride and an enduring link to the history of frontier America "beyond the Alleghenies."

The university is proud of its alumni—affectionately known as the "long magenta line"—including such outstanding individuals as William Rainey Harper, the first president of the University of Chicago, and U. S. Senator John H. Glenn, the first American to orbit the earth, and now the oldest person to have gone into space.

Muskingum University is committed to offering quality academic programs in the liberal arts and sciences in the setting of a residential, coeducational, church-related university and in the context of a caring community where individual fulfillment is encouraged and human dignity is respected. Its primary purpose is to develop whole persons—intellectually, spiritually, socially and physically—by fostering critical thinking, positive action, ethical sensitivity and spiritual growth, so that they may lead vocationally productive, personally satisfying and socially responsible lives.

The Department of Music

Muskingum University's Department of Music offers the Bachelor of Arts degree in music and music education, as well as minors in music and musical theatre. An accredited institutional member of the National Association of Schools of Music since 1935, the Department is also accredited through the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools and the Ohio Department of Education. The Department of Music is housed in Otto and Fran Walter Hall, the newest academic building at Muskingum, which boasts acoustically-designed classrooms and rehearsal facilities, a state-of-the-art music technology lab, and spacious studios and practice rooms.

With its five full-time and fourteen adjunct faculty, the Department is large enough to offer a variety of study and performance opportunities, yet small enough to ensure that the needs of individual students are consistently addressed. Students from across the campus participate in numerous vocal and instrumental ensembles; the Southeastern Ohio Symphony Orchestra, Muskingum Valley Symphonic Winds, and Muskingum Choral Society include members from the community and region.

Vincenzo Bellini

Vincenzo Bellini was an Italian opera composer mostly known for his extremely long flowing melodies. He was named "The Swan of Catania". Bellini was the leading composer of bel canto, an Italian term for the style of operatic singing meaning "beautiful singing", and influenced many other composers of the bel canto style. He was admired by many composers, including Franz Liszt, Frédéric François Chopin, and even Richard Wagner.

Samuel Barber was an American composer, pianist, conductor, baritone, and music educator. He is known for his musical modernism and how his music embarrassed lyricism and emotional expression. He wrote for a diverse group of musicians. His works include: operas, ballets, orchestral pieces, concert band pieces, a wide variety of concertos, chamber music, and choral pieces. He has also written carillon, organ, piano, and vocal solos.

Andrew Lloyd Webber

Andrew Lloyd Webber is an English composer and musical theatre impresario. He is known mostly for his 21 musicals, but also composed song cycles, variations, film scores, and a requiem Mass. He has received numerous awards including knighthood, peerage, six Tony Awards, three Grammys, the Grammy Legend Award, a Golden Globe, an Emmy Award, an Oscar award, and many more. His most well-known musicals are "The Phantom of the Opera", "Cats", "Jesus Christ Superstar", and "Evita".

Reynaldo Hahn

Reynaldo Hahn was a French composer, conductor, and singer. He is best known for his French art songs, or melodies. He was originally born in Venezuela, but his family moved to Paris when he was young. He had great success with his first composition at age 14. He served in the Army during the First World War and continued his music career afterwards with his first operetta. Hahn was of Jewish descent and fled to Monaco during World War II. He returned to Paris in 1945 and served the rest of his life as the director of the Paris Opéra.

Édith Piaf

Édith Piaf was a French singer, actress, and lyricist. She is one of France's most widely known international stars. She specialized in cabaret, torch songs, chanson réaliste, and musical theatre. Her music was usually autobiographical and about love, loss, and sorrow. Piaf is said to have become one of the most celebrated artists of the 20th century.

George Gershwin

George Gershwin was an American composer and pianist. His works can be found in both popular and classical music genres. He is mostly known for his jazz-influenced style. Gershwin was mostly influenced by early 20th century French composers. He was always trying to learn from others, but is rumored to have been turned down by several composers (including Maurice Ravel, Igor Stravinsky, and Arnold Schoenberg) because they didn't want to change what they all thought he was doing perfectly. Ravel even gave him a response along the lines of, "You should give *me* lessons." Gershwin's influence on pop music and musical theater is undeniable.


They Can't Take That Away from Me
