The inaugural cohort of the **John and Annie Glenn Public Service Fellows** was formed in Fall 2019. The Fellows have already demonstrated their commitment to becoming engaged, active citizens and public servants.

Adopting the Village of New Concord

Candidates Forum as one of their first projects, they partnered with Orbit Media – Muskingum's student-led converged media newsgroup – and Village community leaders. They created questions, determined the question and answer format, and moderated the event, which featured Village mayoral and East Muskingum School Board candidates.

The first cohort of the Innovation Fellows, made possible through the generosity of David '81 and Karin Collins '82 Kratoville, will launch in Fall 2020.

Through the **investigation**, **development**, and application of innovation, the program's broad scope is designed to develop students from all disciplines, backgrounds, and interests into holistic, **life-long problem solvers and innovators**.

The program will be directed by Associate Professor of Physics **Dr. Rob Wilson**, and a crossdisciplinary advisory group of faculty and staff will serve as a student resource base.

Innovative Programs Help Meet Regional Workforce Needs

Occupational Therapy:

Partnering with our Regional Healthcare Community

Inspired by healthcare workforce needs and developed through close collaboration with regional occupational therapy education and practice communities, our Master of Occupational Therapy (MOT) program opened in Fall 2019.

Designed for learners who hold an associate degree and a valid Occupational Therapy Assistant license, the program is aligned with the two-year Occupational Therapy Assistant programs offered throughout Ohio.

Delivered through a combination of online learning and on-campus residency weekends, the program prepares MOT graduates to advance their careers and address the critical shortage of occupational therapists in our region.

Jumpstart: Teacher Licensing Supports Demand for K-12 Educators



Flexible graduate and continuing studies options in our highly regarded teacher preparation program serve both experienced educators and those entering the teaching field.

Learners can earn Master of Education, Master of Arts in Teaching, and Educational Specialist graduate degrees, or choose multiple teaching licensure and endorsement programs.

The innovative **Jumpstart program** provides an **accelerated pathway to the high-demand teaching license** for "Intervention Specialist: Mild to Moderate" through an online format.

With options for both initial and advanced licensure candidates, the program features **integrated course** and field work to deliver relevant, hands-on learning.

Jumpstart is Muskingum's response to the demand for K-12 teachers to meet student needs in new and innovative ways.

Nursing: Program Access Expands with New ABSN Degree

Ranked #1 in the state of Ohio by registerednursing.org, our nursing program has achieved a 100% pass rate by graduates on the national nursing licensing exam (NCLEX) and 100% career placement in the field for four consecutive years.

The program currently offers a **Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree** for full-time, pre-licensure students and an adult online **RN to BSN degree** serving established registered nurses.



Beginning in Fall 2020, the new **Accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing** (ABSN) program will expand program access to learners who hold a bachelor's degree or higher in a field other than nursing. Through a combination of online and face-to-face classes, ABSN students will be able to complete their degree in just 15 months.



CONSTRUCTION of the HWC will begin in Summer 2020, and it is expected to open in Fall 2022.

To make the HWC a reality, Muskingum is engaged in a **\$30 MILLION** fundraising campaign.

- A collective, signature \$4.2 million gift from the Board of Trustees, with 100% participation, launched the HWC fundraising effort.
- Alumni council members have made a collective \$350,000 gift to date in support of the HWC.

- Many dedicated alumni and friends have made generous individual gifts.

IN MEMORIAM:

Henry D. Bullock '77, 1955-2019

Trustee and alumnus Henry Dure Bullock '77 was a committed and generous supporter of Muskingum University and its students. In addition to serving on the Board of Trustees for 15 years, he previously served as a member of the Alumni Council.

Henry was an entrepreneur and a world traveler who treasured time spent with family and friends. He loved a good debate, particularly on topics of philosophy and economics, in which he earned his Muskingum Bachelor of Arts degree cum laude. He fondly recalled Professors Joseph B. Elkins and Herbert F. Thomson as inspirational mentors in his life and career.

While at Muskingum, Henry was on the staff of the Black and Magenta newspaper, a contributor to First Circle literary magazine, and a member of Kappa Sigma Fraternity, the honor societies Omicron Delta and Phi Sigma Tau, and the varsity golf team. Golf remained a passion for him throughout his lifetime.

After earning a Master of Business Administration degree from the Kellogg Graduate School of Management at Northwestern University in 1979, Henry began his commercial real estate career. He served in Wells Fargo Bank's Real Estate Industries Group, the commercial mortgage banking operations of Security Pacific Corporation, and as Managing Partner in the Shidler Group.


In 1994, Henry co-founded Menlo Equities, which invests in commercial properties in Silicon Valley and other high-demand, technology- and innovation-driven markets throughout the United States.

In 2016, Henry was awarded an honorary Muskingum Doctorate of Humane Letters degree. He delivered an inspiring commencement speech, challenging the graduating class to combine passion and persistence to reach their goals.

Henry is survived by his companion Sonia Mitchell, son Benjamin (Christina) Bullock, daughter Christine (Brian) Wendell, grandson Brooks Bullock, the mother of his children, Terri Bullock, mother Mary Dure Bullock Johnson, brother Page (Linda) Bullock, and sisters Sarah (David) Nix and Madelene (Eric) Wilson.


